Based on my knowledge of NC State's Diversity-related goals, I cannot be completely sure of what is working and what is not working. However, based on my own experiences and observations, there appears to be a supportive environment for some groups and not others. I believe might be visibly observed by comparing the at least the racial/ethnic make-up of students across the different campuses. On the graduate level, my experiences as a person from an underrepresented background has become increasingly more salient. This might be because there is less than a handful of people in my program who are from underrepresented backgrounds that I may interact with on a week-to-week basis. Most days, I feel out-of-sync with the rest of my peers and cohort. I believe support (not just financial support) for diverse students is lacking. I have not really gained a sense of community within my graduate program that is related to my personal needs and experiences as an underrepresented student. I think this sense of community is also absent at the graduate student organizational level. I wonder if mentoring between colleges or disciplines is a possibility on an intra-institutional level.
